# Lesbians visibility and lesbophobia in France

7126 participants

59 % have been victims of lesbophobia over the past two years.

18 % never engage in public demonstrations of affection.

### What is lesbophobia?

It is a form of social stigma against lesbians and women thought to be lesbians. It is expressed through negative stereotypes such as «lesbians are truck drivers», «between two women, it's actually not really sexual intercourse», verbal abuse, such as insults, threats, mockery, physical aggressions (punches, wounds, rapes, murders etc.) and psychological violence. It is also expressed through multiple types of discriminations: rdenial of service (in restaurants/hotels) or paid holidays... And this, in all dimensions of life: the public sphere, families, friends, work, neighbourhood and health...As gayphobia, transphobia and biphobia, lesbophobia is a very specific phenomenon. Elt is related to how a specific society judges the fact of being a homosexual woman.

Place of residency: urban and regional areas 60% live outside of the Ile-de-France, 30% in the Île-de-France and 5% in French overseas territories and abroad. 45% live in cities of over 200.000 inhabitants.

Relationship status: Single and with no children 70% are declared single, 13% in a civil partnership, 11% in a common-law marriage and 1% are married. A little over 10 % of the respondents have one or more children.

Sexual orientation: lesbians 78 % define themselves as lesbians, 16 % as bisexuals, 1 % heterosexuals and 5 % as other or undefined.

#### Professional situation:

36% are students. 21% are employed, 20% are senior managers and professionnal.

# The conduct of the survey

The gathering of data for the survey was conducted from march 30th to july 20th 2013, via the Internet using SOS homophobie's website, as well as via other tools of broadcast, throughout the country: stands at LGBT events, meetings with respondents in public areas, presentation of the questionnaire to other organizations..

# The publication of the report

The report presenting all the results and their analysis was released on 25th November 2014 during the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women.
